Warm Winter Greetings,

'Tis the season to count our blessings, be joyful in our celebrations, and to feel a bit bittersweet as we reflect on those loved ones, both human and four-legged, who have given us so much joy and who are no longer with us as we impart upon the holidays. Our thoughts are with those of you who have experienced such a loss. The Humane Society has so much to be grateful for, which, in large part is dependent on our partnership with the shelter and the community in caring for and finding homes for the animals needing our assistance. A record number of dogs and cats were adopted from the shelter this year – at 359 adoptions and still counting! Included in that number are 53 cats that were adopted after being housed/displayed at Pet Supplies Plus. The HSMC rescued three dogs from the shelter as fosters, all of which are now in their forever homes and waiting for a visit from Santa. And, three dogs were adopted and successfully completed their heartworm treatment via HSMC sponsorship of their medical costs.

As we look forward to next year, we are planning a different approach to our Annual Reorganization meeting, separating the election of directors and officers from our annual year in review. The official annual meeting for the election will be held on the same night as the regularly scheduled January Board meeting -- January 6th. All HSMC members are encouraged to attend and participate. You'll find the slate of nominees in this newsletter. Then, a bit later in early March we will hold an Annual HSMC Showcase evening at which time we will review the 2019 activities and accomplishments, along with our plans for 2020. HSMC members and the public are invited to come with questions and ideas. At last year's January Annual Reorganization Dinner we faced nasty inclement weather that interfered with our best-laid plans; we're trying to circumvent a repeat of that disappointing evening.

We've had a fun, and productive time participating in community holiday events. Board members volunteered to ring bells for the Salvation Army. For Dickens on the Square we had a living window in the Bird's Nest on Friday evening and assisted Stacie Kwacala, Captured Moments, with *Photos with Santa* on Saturday. Chloe, our most recent foster dog, visited our living window with her foster dad, Lars of Gossel's Dog House, and made an acquaintance that resulted in her adoption. The \$536 from *Photos with Santa* will assist the shelter in necessary restructuring of overhangs on the outdoor dog runs.

Over this last year we sponsored five transports to the Quincy Humane Society's Low Cost Spay/ Neuter, resulting in 109 cats being altered and receiving their vaccines. The number of transports was fewer due to the slow recuperation of the Quincy veterinarian after a car accident. We are pleased to report that we have February and March transports scheduled to begin our 2020 spay/ neuter initiative.

We wish you very Happy Holidays and look forward to your continued interest in and support of our work for needy animals.

Brix Challenge Is Another Success!

Those who took on Chris' challenge this year donated an amazing \$13,630.00. Funds raised through *The Brix Challenge* enable the HSMC to continue and improve its important interventions to help animals in need in our county. **The generous gifts received during this year's** *Brix Challenge* will make the world a better place for many animals in need in McDonough County through HSMC initiatives.

A few of those include:

1) PROMOTING ADOPTIONS of cats and dogs at the McDonough

County Animal Shelter via weekly posters, social media, news outlets and sponsorship; promoting adoptions of hard-to-place animals through reduced adoption fees and/or medical intervention, for example.

2) **RESCUE AND FOSTER** of those animals that don't get adopted from the McDonough County Animal Shelter by moving those animals whose time is running out at the shelter into foster homes where they can live in a family and enjoy socialization while awaiting their forever home.

3) **REDUCING OVERPOPULATION** through two separate spay/neuter programs. One serves to promote adoption of animals at the shelter by subsidizing the cost of altering animals adopted from the shelter. The other is a partnership with the Quincy Humane Society that provides transportation and spay/neuter for barn/feral cats at no cost to the caretaker. If space is available companion dogs and cats may take advantage of this for a nominal fee.

4) **PROVIDING MEDICAL CARE** to shelter animals with special needs and County animals in emergency situations through the discretionary use of our long-standing "Angel Fund."

5) **HELPING KEEP ANIMALS IN THEIR HOMES** and with their families when they meet with financial distress via the Pet Food Pantry now available in cooperation with Loaves and Fishes.

We are extremely grateful to everyone who participated in the Brix Challenge 2019!

I taught her a lot, like how not to scratch, steal food, and dig up plants. While things have been better, I recently noticed that she has gained a lot of weight and was not playing and grooming like she used to. I thought it was a good time to get a second cat.

I went to the shelter and adopted Fran (formerly Jetta). Fran is a 4-month-old kitten with a bob tail. I was hoping to find an older cat to tame Virginia's wild soul, but seeing Fran zoom around the shelter chasing fluffs of hair melted my heart. I knew she was the one.

I knew she needed a home with lots of toys and room to run, one without children, and a patient mama to teach her to be good. I didn't realize that I adopted an angel. There wasn't a single fight and there still hasn't been one weeks later. They literally played 24 hours straight the first night and I wouldn't have it any other way. Virginia is so gentle to her. I don't know if it's the size difference or the amount of double takes staring at her stub, but she knows this baby is delicate. She tries to clean Fran who only wants to play and follows her from room to room to watch Fran quietly play with her many toys.

Fran is such a cuddler. While Virginia never was a cuddler, she is now, lying next to me as I write this. They are the perfect pair, my salty and sweet babies. I'm so happy that I adopted my baby a friend.

She immediately bloomed into a happy girl, who loved playing and running with her buddies at the Dog House. She bonded with Lars and learned trust, self-confidence, and basic skills. Chloe had made such progress that we believed she was ready for a public outing and she made an appearance at our Living Window at Dickens on the Square. And, lo and behold. While in the Birds Nest, she met with her destiny. Lars and a very nice lady struck up a conversation and we learned that she and her husband were looking for a friend for Bentley, their I year old Blue Heeler. Two days later they visited Gossel's Dog House with Bentley and decided it was a perfect match. They completed an adoption application which we reviewed and approved. A week later Chloe went to her forever home with her new parents, Bentley, and three cats.. Good-byes were sad, but the joy of new beginnings was in the air.
