Greetings,

It's been a busy and productive summer. As we enter August and the end-of-summer events, we want to catch you up on HSMC activities and note those yet to come. By doing this, we can also reflect on where we've been and where we want to go. The months fly by and we get so busy that we sometimes forget to stop and do an accounting – of what worked, what may have been done better (or easier), and how best we can move forward. And this is where your input is so important.

Right before WIU's spring classes came to a close we coordinated with Woodrum's Automotive and the student Humane Society Service Association to bring back the HSMC dog wash. We had a great time and loved seeing all the dogs – many of which were rescued from the shelter. We plan to make this an annual event.

We've continued to sponsor transports to Quincy Humane Society's low cost spay/neuter clinic on a monthly basis since March of this year. So far we have altered 103 cats and have reached the maximum of 30 signed up for the August trip. Feedback from those participating is heart-felt and appreciative, letting us know how valuable this initiative is to the community.

We changed the location of *Wine, Whiskers, and Whimsy* to the American Legion this year to accommodate the growing interest in this fund-raiser and to provide a more spacious and comfortable setting in which to visit and bid on the auction items. It worked. We had record attendance and profit, and received positive reviews from happy participants; we plan to schedule our event at the Legion again this next year.

Over the last couple of years we have limited focus on placing cats and dogs that had been at the shelter for a lengthy time into foster homes. Instead we have sought sponsors for these animals or promoted them as *HSMC Picks* to reduce or cover their adoption fees. This strategy has benefitted the animals. Just over the last couple of months five cats have been sponsored (two by Felix and Nancy Chu and three by the HSMC), resulting in adoptions. We have also been covering shelter dogs' medical needs via Heart Worm treatment, tumor removals, and amputation. Most recently, we offered to pay for Duke's Heart Worm treatment to promote his adoption. Treatment was begun while he remained at the shelter. His adoption is now pending with a young family who will continue his Heart Worm treatment protocol in a loving home.

And finally, we are actively exploring the possibilities for a new animal shelter and determining what it will take to bring this dream to fruition. In the meantime we are purchasing a set of cat condos to install in one of the existing shelter cat rooms. These condos can then be moved to a new shelter once it's established. This will allow shelter staff and volunteers (and the cats) to see how well the condos meet our needs, and if we would want to purchase this design down the road.



Poison Ivy and Dogs

Can You Recognize This Leaf?

All of these are the same pesky, rash-inducing plant. Poison ivy leaves sometimes appear with jagged or lobed edges, and sometimes smooth.



Same Plant, Many Forms

Poison ivy can present as a vine or a shrub. When mature vines climb up a tree, their shape can even mimic that of the host tree. Simply pushing aside an innocent-seeming branch could make the passer-by pay a few days later, when a rash begins to well up. Jelesko's latest research, which is not yet published, finds that in cities poison ivy tends to grow as a climbing vine, whereas out in the forest, most of the plants are ground-creeping vines. And poison ivy is much more prevalent in "landscapes modified by humans" than out in the middle of the woods. Some poison ivy vines can be downright awe-inspiring in their size, like the one in this video.

If your pup came along with you on the outing that exposed you to poison ivy, never fear. Dogs are not allergic — but their fur can definitely hold the oil and transfer it to their owners, so pet your dog with caution after hiking past poison ivy. Scientists haven't found many animals that break out like humans do, though lab mice seem to be allergic enough for research.


