**To Treat or Not--
How to Improve the Quality of Life
Part 2: Possible Options to Consider

Pet owners often ask me how they will know when it is time to end the life of their pet. They will often also ask me if there are things that can be done to extend the life of their pet. The balance between the two—treating or not—can be very difficult to find when your pet is sick or chronically ill. Last time we looked at 8 key indicators to determine your pet's quality of life. This time we will take these same 8 indicators and look at ways to help improve quality of life.

1. PAIN. PAIN MANAGEMENT IS PROBABLY THE MOST IMPORTANT CONSIDERATION FOR QUALITY OF LIFE. Pain management will apply to several of the other key indicators on this list. Fortunately, over the last 10 years there has been an explosion in options for pain management in pets. Medication wise, the main categories of pain drugs used in veterinary medicine include non-steroidal anti-inflammatories (NSAIDs), narcotics, NDMA inhibitors, and GABA drugs. There are other classes of drugs and new options continue to be explored. Many people have a negative perception of using “pain drugs” for their pets and are often surprised at the difference in their pets when they are on appropriate medication. Supplements such as glucosamine, chondroitin, MSM, omega 3 fatty acids, etc. can play a role in some types of pain. (As a side note, CBD has become very trendy and is being promoted as great for all sorts of conditions. To date, there are very few studies on how beneficial they are in pets.) Ice packs for fresh injuries and heat packs for chronic injuries can help some pets that are painful. Physical therapy, massage, acupuncture, and chiropractor treatments are also options depending on the condition being considered.
2. APPETITE. Increasing appetite can be accomplished in many ways. Newer veterinary specific medications such as Elura for cats and Entyce for dogs help stimulate appetite for various conditions. Older medications such as mirtazapine, cyproheptadine, and valium can also be tried. Non-medication ways to improve appetite include heating the food, adding water to the food or slowly switching to canned food, and top dressing the food with small amounts of human food such as chicken, beef, rice, pasta, and bread. Care must be used anytime new foods are introduced and you must go slowly to avoid GI upset.
3. HYDRATION. Increasing water consumption can be as easy as adding water to the food or switching to canned food. Making the water cold by frequently adding ice cubes or by having 2 bowls that you freeze completely and alternate as they melt throughout the day is a good way to increase drinking. Frequently providing fresh water throughout the day will increase consumption in a lot of pets. If you think about it, how appealing is a room temperature glass of water that has been sitting out all day? Flavoring the water with chicken stock (avoid high sodium content by not using commercial broths) or low sodium tuna juice can increase water consumption. Providing aerated water via a fountain is also a great way to increase consumption, especially in cats. Recently there have been some companies marketing “pet waters” that contain electrolytes. The role of these products for the critically ill remains to be seen.

4. **HYGIENE.** Bathing and brushing, if tolerated, may help some ill animals feel better. It is also a way to increase bonding with your pet. Treating pesky skin lesions/skin infections and ear infections that occur secondary to many illnesses may help certain pets feel better. I am always surprised at how improved pet owners report their pet to be after treating skin infections. If you think about it, skin is your biggest organ. And when your biggest organ doesn't feel well, you don't feel well.
5. **ACTIVITY/MOBILITY.** Much of improving decreased mobility is pain management. There are many different pain medications available. There are also many supplements, chondroprotectants (Adequan), and alternative therapies (physical therapy, therapy laser, etc.) to help control the pain that is slowing your pet down. If your pet is heavy, he/she will have a harder time getting around as they age. Alter your pets' diet, count calories, and get back in the habit of portion control. Just like us, losing weight can be a tremendous help for mobility. For targeted painful areas (especially knees), consider the use of braces/splints to help support the pet.
6. **HAPPINESS/MENTAL STATUS.** Again, some of this may be related to pain and appropriate pain management is necessary. It is hard to be happy when it hurts to move. Some animals will experience dementia like signs, or cognitive dysfunction disease (CDS) as it is called in pets. Making changes in the household and routines to accommodate the aging pet can help. Consider other pets in the house. Does a young, boisterous pet (or child) annoy or pester your older pet just a bit too much? If so, consider providing a safe place that only your older pet can access. Does your house have a lot of stairs? Does your pet have a harder time getting up on the bed? Consider making it easier for your pet to stay on one floor for the bulk of the day. Think about ramps and steps to help your pet get up on couches/beds and in and out of the house.
7. **GENERAL BEHAVIOR PATTERNS.** Many mitigations for various strange behaviors should be considered. Most of which have already been discussed above.
8. **OWNER PERCEPTIONS.** Sometimes the best way to improve a pet's quality of life is start with you! Have you just made the assumption that "your pet is old?" Are financial limitations or the fear that any treatments will be too expensive hindering helping your pet? Call your vet!! Your vet should be more than willing to come up with treatment options that fit every budget and can help you make a good decision on how realistic it is to have a positive outcome and improve quality of life. A good exam, consultation, and honest conversation with your vet can make a huge difference.

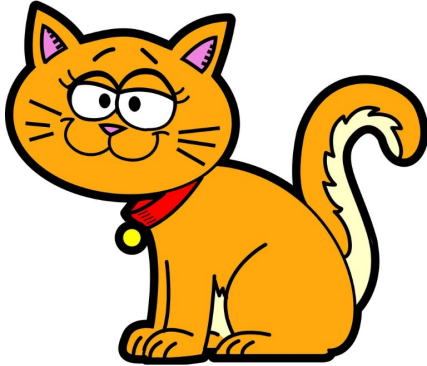
30 Fun Dog Facts (1-6) from the American Kennel Club:
